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Old-Time Radio Meets Modern Music<br>Brian Kavanaugh

Over a year ago, I started noticing some unusual traffic and comments on our YouTube channel for the first audition episode of Dangerously Yours titled "Masquerade," recorded June 20, 1944. We were getting regular comments that listed a timestamp within the episode and nothing else. Eventually one of the commenters mentioned the band TV Girl and the song "Cigarettes Out the Window" as one of the sources of the traffic.

In the last few months, "Masquerade" has come to dominate the traffic on our channel. In December 2022 alone it garnered 63,390 views - nearly double the rest of the top ten combined.
Additionally, the Dangerously Yours episodes "The Pirate of New Orleans" and "The Highwayman" - both sampled by TV Girl - were the number two and number five most viewed episodes in December, respectively.

Curious as to how the band came across an obscure audition for a radio series that aired for about three months towards the end of World War II, I emailed them with some questions. Brad Petering, the lead singer, was gracious enough to respond. The interview has been edited for grammar and clarity.

OTRR: That is an obscure episode from a relatively unknown series. How did you learn about it?
Brad: I'm prone to scouring the internet for things to sample and came across the
cache of old radio shows. I like the Dangerously Yours series. I quite like the voice of Victor Jory and the female cast as well. They have a very melodramatic way of speaking that works well when laid over an instrumental. That episode in particular, "Masquerade", is just great.

OTRR: What was the process for incorporating it into your songs? Did you have the episode in mind when writing them, or did you write the songs first and look for appropriate samples for them?
Brad: I have the songs pretty much done and then fool around putting various sounds after, various snippets of dialogue and what have you. Usually, I look for a scene that has some kind of relevance to the topic of the song.

OTRR: What songs have you used it in? I know of "The Getaway", "Cigarettes Out the Window" and "Heaven is a Bedroom." Are there others? [Editor's Note: see the list as of January 2023 at the end]
Brad: Probably little pieces in a whole bunch of songs.

OTRR: Are there other examples of oldtime radio episodes in your songs?
Brad: I know There's a little snippet of some forgotten talk show in "Stupid Actress". Can't remember them all.

OTRR: According to your band's Wikipedia article, you have often sampled 1960s songs and media. This is quite a bit before that period. Is that an accurate description (and this episode is
an outlier), or is the range of things you sample broader?
Brad: I don't place any restriction on what I might sample. But it's more satisfying to pick out something old. Something obscure and untouched. It's nice to give a little life to forgotten media, especially since some of it was so good.

OTRR: Do you (or did you) listen to old-time radio and, if so, what series did you typically listen to? What were some of your favorites? Brad: I do sometimes. Especially if I'm actively putting songs together and have a space for a bit of dialogue or something to scratch into the hook. I'll put it on in the background while I play chess or do chores and wait for something interesting to catch my ear. I'm not gonna lie, a lot of these old stories are quite generic and formulaic, so I generally prefer stories that are a bit odd. I can't for the life of me remember what it was called, but there was this one story, I sampled it at the end of "Death of a Party Girl." The story was about a young girl who has an imaginary friend in the form of a doll. She ends up murdering a would-be suitor, bashing his head in with a rock in fact, when he tries to rid her of her childish fantasies. That would be strange enough as it is, but the story continues. It jumps ahead to the future when the girl has grown up to be a sad and desperate alcoholic old woman. And then it just ends. It was incredibly sad and strange. I wish I could remember what it was called. [Editor's Note: from the description, James Decker was able to identify it as the episode "The Torment of Henrietta Robinson, and Why She Killed" from Crime Classics].

OTRR: Anything else that might be interesting to our group?
Brad: You may be aware of it already, but there's a really funny podcast called "Mike Detective" by Scott Aukerman and Rob Huebel that's basically a parody of an old timey Philip Marlowe radio series. I recommend it!

## The Suspense Project: A Daily Blogpost Joe Webb

All of the surviving episodes of Suspense augmented by production history, episode analysis, and behind-the-scenes maneuvering, are detailed every day at https://suspenseproject.blogspot.com/ . The project will last until all of the episodes are posted; the postings will last for about two years and seven months, ending in the summer of 2025.

Most all of the recordings will be available in lossless FLAC, selected from recordings assembled for 15+ years from numerous sources and selected for their overall sound quality and other characteristics. Numerous collectors and researchers have generously shared their collections and knowledge that have made this possible.

Recently, the Old Time Radio Researchers and associated groups, especially The Knights of the Turning Table, have worked to acquire the tape collections of some of the hobby's pioneer collectors. This has resulted in many new versions of recordings being found and significant upgrades to the recordings of episodes from the later years of the series.

Thank you to everyone who has participated and continues to do so, diligently working to find discs and disc recordings and airchecks to restore these recordings with today's digital technologies. Thank you especially to all of the collectors who have gone before us. Their hard work in the pre-digital age of recording is resulting in a superior and more complete collection than they could have ever imagined. This project, and all of the generous collectors who contribute to it today, stand on their strong shoulders.

New blogposts will be available every day at 5:00AM Eastern US time. Recordings will be available at the Internet Archive (link provided in each blogpost) on an individual page for each episode. The Internet Archive is supplied with FLAC recordings but also creates an MP3 file for use on various portable devices or any use that the listener finds convenient. Episodes can also be easily streamed on its page.

## Transcription Transfers: Subscription for 36,000 RAW .WAV files

Radio Archives is excited to announce the Transcription Disc Transfers subscription program. This is the first time our preservation work has been offered, to a select number of collectors.

For serious collectors of old-time radio, this is the most important announcement you will hear in your years of collecting.

The mission of Radio Archives for 23 years has been preservation and restoration.


From the very beginning on January 1, 2000, we have taken a truly archival approach to the preservation of programs from radio's Golden Age. We believe it is our responsibility to treat the many rare, historic, and frequently one-of-a-kind recordings that come to us with the care and respect they deserve. After all, many if not most of these recordings are the only audio record of broadcasts that were performed live seventy, eighty, or even ninety years ago.

This is our history, the history of broadcasting, and we take our work very seriously. Our slogan since the beginning has been: "Preserve radio's past for the future".

Have you ever wished you could own the same library of radio shows that Radio Archives has? Now you can. When you subscribe, you will be on your way to owning all 36,000 programs we have digitized over the years. You will have access to the raw audio in lossless digital formats of .WAV and .FLAC. In addition, there will also be .MP3 versions for your convenience.


## Background

Over the last 23 years Radio Archives has digitized approximately 36,000 radio shows. Only a fraction of these have been restored and sold on our website.

We start with the best possible source recordings usually 16 " transcription discs - recorded by the networks while a program was first broadcast. We bought the transcription discs for between $\$ 5$ to $\$ 50$ a disc with some rare discs at $\$ 500$ each. Yes, there are a number of these rare discs in this collection.

To get a high quality, professional transfer, the discs must be cleaned. We used two ultra-sonic cleaners. One with the chemicals and one filled with reverse osmosis water for rinsing. Then they go to the Radio Archives recording studio where we digitize the discs using state of the art, high end, professional audio equipment, including many different size styli, so we can go up and down the

groove wall to get the very best sound. Our studio rate is $\$ 125$ per hour. This results in a .WAV file of the highest quality possible.

We have never offered raw lossless digital audio files before. This subscription includes every program that Radio Archives has preserved. Each file is a first- or second-generation transfer. Transfers are mainly from transcription discs with some being from open reel tape. The files are all $44,100 \mathrm{~Hz}, 16$ bit.WAV files, which is standard Red Book Audio CD specifications. No restored audio is involved in this offer.


Tom Brown describes the half of the company devoted to preservation as "A money pit and time sink". The restoration half of the company is what the public is familiar with. This is what finances the preservation work. Browse through the 2,300 products on this website to see what we have created in the last 23 years.

## Dropbox

You only need a free Dropbox account. With a free account you can still access the entire contents of a shared folder no matter how large it is. Files can also be downloaded directly to your own devices. The shared Dropbox folder will contain all of the files released for the project. Starting on April 1, 2023, 600 files will be added monthly to Dropbox. The second month there will be 1,200 files, the third month 1,800 , etc. until after 5 years, all 36,000 files will be in Dropbox. More details about how Dropbox works can be found below in the Frequently Asked Questions section.

## Pricing

How is such a project like this even possible? This is a ridiculous number of files and 23 years of work. We value the collection at between 1.5 and 2 million dollars. The answer is that the costs are being split three ways. 1) This was the source for our restorations, 2) we are donating the raw collection to a museum in exchange for a large tax deduction, and 3 ) the smallest part is this subscription program.

If you don't want to subscribe, you can purchase the first 600 files for a one-time payment of $\$ 240.00$, which is only 40 cents per file.

## Rogue's Gallery <br> Roger Hohenbrink

The following summary was written for the original Certified release of Rogue's Gallery. It is included in the most recent Maintained update.

Rogue's Gallery came to the Mutual network on September 27, 1945 with Dick Powell portraying Richard Rogue, a private detective who invariably ended up getting knocked out each week and spending his dream time in acerbic conversation with his subconscious self Eugor.

Rogue's Gallery was, in a sense, Dick Powell's rehearsal for Richard Diamond. Powell played private detective Richard Rogue, who trailed luscious blondes, protected witnesses, and did whatever else detectives do to make a living. It was a good series, though not destined to make much of a mark. Under the capable direction of Dee Englebach and accompanied by the music of Leith Stevens, Powell floated through his lines with the help of a supporting cast that included Lou Merrill, Gerald Mohr, Gloria Blondell, Tony Barrett, and Lurene Tuttle. Peter Leeds played Rogue's friend Eugor, an obscure play on names with Eugor spelling Rogue backwards.

The gimmick in Rogue's Gallery was the presence of an alter ego, "Eugor," who arrived in the middle of the show to give Rogue enough information for his final deduction. Eugor was a state of mind, achieved when Rogue was knocked unconscious. Eugor would appear cackling like the host of Hermit's Cave and impart some vital information the hero had overlooked. Rogue would then awaken with a vague idea of what to do next.

Rogues Gallery featured different actors as Rogue in later incarnations of the series, but Richard Powell was the most popular. This series preceded Richard Powell's most famous series, Richard Diamond. Rogue trailed lovely blondes and protected witnesses as the new tough guy persona of Dick Powell. This was the transition series for Powell in his quest to be recognized as an actor rather than a singer. It had some of the same cute elements that would make Richard Diamond a high spot four years later.


During the summer of 1946, the show was billed as Bandwagon Mysteries, with a tip of the hat to the sponsor. In the summer of 1947 it was again revived on NBC Sundays for Fitch, with Barry Sullivan in the title role. In 1950 the character again turned up in a two-year sustainer on the ABC Wednesday-night schedule. Chester Morris, the original Boston Blackie, played the lead.


Dick Powell<br>Roger Hohenbrink

The following biography was written for the original Certified release of Rogue's Gallery. It is included in the most recent Maintained update.

Dick Powell (November 14, 1904 - January 2, 1963) was a singer, actor, producer, and director. Born in Mountain View, Arkansas, Powell started his entertainment career as a singer. He was signed by Warner Bros. in 1932 and made his film debut as a singing bandleader in Blessed Event. He went on to star as a boyish crooner in movies such as $42 n d$ Street, Footlight Parade, Gold Diggers of 1933, Flirtation Walk, and On the Avenue, often appearing opposite Ruby Keeler.

In 1944 Powell abruptly switched to noir detective roles, first starring as Philip Marlowe in Murder, My Sweet. He became a popular tough-guy lead, appearing in movies such as Cornered, Johnny O'Clock, and The Tall Target. Even when he appeared in lighter fare such as The Reformer and the Redhead and Mrs. Mike, he never sang in his later roles.

Rogue's Gallery came to the Mutual radio network on September 27, 1945, with Dick Powell portraying Richard Rogue, a private detective who invariably ended up getting knocked out each week and spending his dream time in acerbic conversation with his subconscious self, Eugor.

From 1949 until 1953 Powell played the lead role in the NBC radio theater production Richard Diamond, Private Detective. His character in the 30-minute weekly was a likeable private detective with a quick wit.

In the 1950s Powell produced and directed several B-movies and was one of the founders of Four Star Television, appearing in and supervising several shows for that company.

Powell died on January 2, 1963, of stomach cancer, one of many of the cast and crew of the 1956 movie The Conqueror, who died of the disease. The Conqueror had been filmed in Utah near an atomic test site. He is buried at Forest Lawn Memorial Park Cemetery.

Powell's first wife, from 1925 until 1927, was Mildred Maund. His second wife, from September

19, 1936 until 1944, was Joan Blondell, with whom he had two children, Ellen and Norman. His third wife, from August 19, 1945 until his death, was June Allyson, with whom he had two children, Pamela (adopted) and Richard, Jr.

Wistful Vistas
From the Editor's Desk

Greetings and salutations to all old-time radio enthusiasts in the area. We are several weeks into 2023 by the time you're reading this and, as usual, there's plenty going on in the hobby.

One of the biggest announcements has been Radio Archives' 5-year 36,000 shows subscription program. Without a doubt RA is one of the most highly respected producers of radio series sets, so their plan to release their entire catalog via a multi-year subscription model certainly has garnered a lot of attention.

The flat price-point of $\$ 120 /$ month ( $\$ 60 /$ month if you sign up before March 31) will be very steep for many hobbyists. This has to be weighed against the sheer volume of material one will receive in return. Subscribers are told to expect approximately 600 shows per month!

On one hand, that's only 10-20 cents per show, so one only needs to listen and enjoy a fraction of the programs to make the monetary investment worthwhile. On the other hand, one may end up paying for a lot of content that will never get a listen. In fact, only the youngest readers could reasonably expect to listen to all these shows even if they wanted to. Plus, there will be the time needed to store and organize the shows in an accessible way.

I'll be very curious to hear the initial responses and opinions upon launch in April. It will also be very interesting to see in the longterm if the project has the legs to last for five years.

Welcome to our first mailing of 2023.
The one thing that will never stop changing is that change itself will always keep happening! Certain aspects of oldtime radio, however, have never changed. Those who were great on radio always will be. The recordings will not change.
Some changes are in fact, exciting! The number of new shows that are still being found and brought to life with newer and better technology is exciting. Meantime, what started out as an available selection of a few hundred shows has now expanded into a number in the hundreds of thousands.
Today, it's impossible to print a "complete catalog" because it could never be "complete" because new shows are being added at such a feverish pace. This is mostly due to the work of those mentioned at the end of this mailer and every catalog. It would also require many hundreds of pages.

Our job is to polish the show to the extent they need to be then make them available to you. Today, however, it won't be in the form of cassette tapes! That was one of those "changes" and there will be more as we move through time.

This past year, we lost one of the leaders of old-time radio, Jay Hickerson. Jay and I became good friends starting in the mid 1970s and thoughout his years as Chairman of the Friends of Old-Time Radio conventions (which I attended almost every year).

In addition, a few months ago, Specs Howard also passed who founded a Detroit area broadcast and media arts school some 50 years ago. That was following his esteemed career in the broadcast industry. Specs was my daytime employer for more than 10 years during which I built some 20 studios for both student practice and campus radio stations. Idid that while teaching staff and students how to use the new equipment. That was my daytime job up until almost 10 years ago.

These are the changes I've seen that have impacted the way we package and deliver old-time radio.
Today, that seven foot rack of analog equipment is also no longer needed because most of the whole process is handled faster and better with computer software.
