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Researching old-time radio programs can be a feast-or-famine endeavor. Due to the happenstance of history, we as a hobby are blessed with abundant documentation about some areas of the broadcasting industry during radio's Golden Age but absolutely nothing about other areas of that radio era. Fortunately, Arthur B. Church, the founder of Kansas City's CBS-affiliate KMBC, was quite thorough in holding on to station records and documents for decades, from the station's beginnings in the mid-1920s to its sale in the early 1950s.

Radio historians are further fortunate that Church, instead of destroying the records upon his retirement, decided to hold on to them and eventually donate them to a university library that was willing to preserve them for decades. This has allowed us fans of the era to do in-depth research and writing about the original programming of a mid-size market station, an unusual feat in contrast to the national and regional network programming that has been a bit easier to document.

An example of the shows into which the KMBC archives allow a modern insight is *A.G. Musical Grocers*, a daily (except Sundays) series that aired over the station in 1934 from Thursday April 12 to Wednesday July 11 for a total of 78 episodes. Interestingly, this was the third series in as many years that bore the

*Musical Grocers* title, the earlier two possibly serving as a level of inspiration for the third. In 1932 CBS broadcast a weekly series *The Musical Grocer* starring Irving Kaufman, and in 1933 NBC aired *The Musical Grocery Store* featuring Tom Howard, Jeannie Lang, Tiny Ruffner, and Billy Best.

In the KMBC series the "A.G." stood for Associated Grocers, a group of independent grocers in Kansas City who in 1924 banded together to protect their market share against the larger chain grocers. By combining their orders from product manufacturers and storing their respective goods at a single location, the independent stores could get more competitive pricing in line with the chains. One hundred years later the organization continues on as Associated Wholesale Grocers.

In 1934 the Associated Grocers approached KMBC about designing a program to promote aligned stores and specific products they wanted to advertise on a given day. The result was the quarter-hour *A*-*G* (or *A*.*G*.) *Musical Grocers*. In an inter-office memo written by station writer-singer-actor Gomer Cool (profiled here) described the program as "a combination of music, comedy, and <u>intensive selling</u>."

The series revolved around two main characters, Al Short and George Tracy (A and G) who owned an A-G store in the fictional Maple Grove. Al was played by Gomer Cool and George by Paul Henning, the show's writer. Henning would eventually go on to write at the network level make his name in television as the creator of *The Beverly Hillbillies*. Cool related that Al and George "greet the customers – sell them the various A-G specials just as any grocer would do." Utilizing their singing talents, Cool and Henning would "sing praises of their A-G store and its products." The duo parodied popular tunes of the day, rewriting lyrics to focus on Associated Grocers products and sales.

Al and George were joined by Olaf, the meat cutter's assistant. Paul Sells, simultaneously a member of KMBC's Texas Rangers and later musician for Gene Autry, voiced the Swede and pitched in with some accordian music, even adding his baritone on occasion. Stock boy Elmer Jones, the slow but loveable town inventor, was played by Herb Kratoska (also concurrently a member of the musical Texas Rangers) who added guitar when required. The final core character as Flash, a Black delivery boy who provided comic relief. Portrayed by Eddie Edwards, Flash was one of several Black characters Edwards played on different KMBC series, among them "Cookie" on Life on Red Horse Ranch, "George Washington White" on Happy Hollow, and "Sam" on Joanne Taylor's Fashion Flashes.

Other KMBC actors passed through Maple Grove playing various customers, among them Mrs.

Straightlace, "the town reformer," Mrs. Gabriel (Gabby), who never stopped talking, and Mr. Gardiner, a newlywed, Grandma Perkins, Freddy Finch, Dr. Ford, Mrs. Murphy, Mr. Weston, and Miss O'Neil.

Henning daily wrote specific goods into the script that A.G. Stores would then have on specials that same day. These same goods were advertised in the daily newspapers as well. Given the unfortunate lack of surviving scripts, modern fans can only surmise how goods such as Derby Chili, Lakeside Vegetables, and Aines California Cottage Cheese were deftly woven into the "fast moving, jolly" storyline which supposedly carried "a thread of human interest from day to day."

Despite the future success of so many of its cast, *Musical Grocers* wasn't the sales driver for which A.G. Stores hoped and the series said "Auf Weidersehen" on July 11, 1934. There is no indication in extant KMBC records that they attempted to revive the series with a different sponsor, nor are any recordings known to have been made of the series during its short run.

## Who is "Therd Jefre"? Joe Webb

The following piece was originally published on Joe Webb's blog <u>"The Suspense Project,"</u> chronicling every episode of the long-running fan-favorite series. His multi-year series of posts provide background and a link to every circulating and extant Suspense recording. This background of the mysterious author Therd Jefre was <u>originally published on May 15</u>, 2024.

While *Alibi Me* (*Suspense*, January 4, 1951) is a good story and succeeded in radio and television, the mystery of the author's identity persisted the entire time the recordings have been in the hobby... and perhaps even longer. Until now.

"Therd Jefre" sounds like an Eastern European name. When Elliott Lewis got the script or the outline of it, he immediately liked it. The person in charge of the legal administration of the show for contracts was contacted by film documentarian John Scheinfeld in the 1970s. John was in college and was researching the series in a wide range of topics. His contact recalled that Jefre was "either mute or blind" and implied that they did not have direct dealings with "him." Recently, a Google search turned up a copyright entry for a 1948 stage play by "Therd Jefre." This Google search for Jefre never been successful in years past. Searches of genealogy sites never worked either. But this time, the Google search brought up a play and its name and that finally led somewhere.

General researcher and classic radio enthusiast and author Karl Schadow was contacted. Karl has been a valuable and generous contributor to the *Suspense* blog project. For background on Karl and his research at the Library of Congress, go to this 2018 profile of him at the Library of Congress blog <u>https://blogs.loc.gov/loc/2018/05/inquiringminds-bringing-radios-golden-age-back-tolife/</u> Many collectors know his work authoring booklets for Radio Spirits CD sets.

Karl was able to find the 1948 copyright filing for the stage play, but there was another document in the folder that was atypical. It was an affidavit from 1967 indicating a pseudonym was used in the original registration. Karl remarked how odd this was, because pseudonyms were typically included in the filings of the original registration or added quickly thereafter. This one, however, was 19 years after the filing.

Ruth H. Brandt, being duly sworn, deposes and says: 1. My sister Mae L. Brandt and I are the authors of "Is This Me", Registration No. D Unpub 17590 Class D. 2. The application for the above-numbered registration bore only our pseudown "Therd Jefre" in tead of our legal names or both our legal names and our pseudonym. 3. I hereby request the Copyright Office to show on the records of Registration No. D Unpub 17590 Class D the legal names of my sister Mae L Brandt and myself in addition to the pseudonym now appearing thereon. Muth H. Brandt

The sisters, Ruth and Mae Brandt, were freelance writers to 1940s NY radio advertising agencies and producers. They were listed as "Brandt Production Services" in various business guides, providing "program production and writing of scripts, radio commercials, and jingles." It appears that they had "subsistence" freelance careers, never hitting it big, but making enough money to get by and continue their work. They had many copyright registrations of plays and musicals, and some radio ideas, but there is no indication that any of them were ever presented based on newspaper searches for each title.

They had many ideas for new radio series. Some were mentioned in columns of industry publications. One of the trade magazines had an annual supplement where such ideas could be pitched. This catalog listed many shows that were already in syndication but also had many programs that would become available once funded by a sponsor or a station.

In the mid-1940s the Brandts tried really hard to get a show concept that would catch on, and they had many ideas. They needed just one to get them more firmly established in the business. Among the ideas they pitched were a panel discussion by literary critics and authors *The Best Short Story of the Week*, game shows *Eight Bits* and *Top and Bottom*, and a daily show about a small-town old judge who dispensed life advice, *Hickadee's Judge*. A show called Complaints Adjusted was about giving people advice about their problems. It was like the Brandts made a list of genres and tried to develop and idea for each one. Mysteries were always popular, so they pitched a concept similar to Christie's Miss Marple about a spinster sleuth named Innocence Threadleaf. With the war still in process, there was always audience interest in people in the service and those returning home. They proposed an inspiring program about veterans returning to civilian life called *Looking* Forward. They also suggested a show about those still in the service and their thoughts of home and the love they left behind. Their idea was how service personnel had "a date" using the wartime V-Mail postal service appropriately called Via V-Mail. None of these seem to have caught on.

There was a hint of possible success about a radio script being picked up as a movie. One 1940s trade newspaper claimed that "Brooklyn's scriptwins have Universal Pictures plenty interested in their latest radio script, 'Tete A Tete With Thais'." No record of its radio production could be found, nor of a motion picture. Karl Schadow says it sounds like something that might have been used on *Grand Central Station*, but we may never know.

In the 1950 Census they claimed to have lived with their widowed mother, a sister who worked as a secretary, and a brother who worked at the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Ruth and Mae's occupations were listed as "writer." They all lived in one side of a brick duplex house, built in 1930, near the Sheepshead Bay section of Brooklyn. They used their home address as their business address.

There is one surviving radio script that the Brandts wrote that made it to a network broadcast. It was the 1943-03-20 *Stars over Hollywood* "I'll Never Forget." No recording has survived, but they are credited and announced as the authors, according to the script. This is the only complete hard copy radio script that is available to our knowledge. A 1961 edition of a trade newspaper for the theatrical business, *Back Stage*, mentioned an upcoming theatrical project by the Brandts. In that news item, it said that they had written for *Grand Central Station, Silver Theater*, and *Armstrong Theater*. The broadcast log information for these series is lacking, and there are no newspaper mentions of their specific programs. The clip also mentioned the TV series *Bat Masterson*. A check of IMDb listings for this western program has no mention of the Brandts (or Therd Jefre). In some cases, they may have worked on script revisions and not received screen credit, or used yet another pseudonym that has yet to be discovered. (There is more information about that *Back Stage* news item below).

"Alibi Me" seems to stand alone as a big success and it's not even under their name. That's what makes this so very curious. When they were contacted about the script, they likely claimed to be "Mr. Jefre's agents" and he was "always out" or "unavailable" or if the mute ruse was in play, "he can't speak on the phone." It may be a pseudonym, but it almost borders on hoax. *Suspense* staffers seem to have accepted the excuse at face value, and accepted the script, which they liked.

Why did the Brandts even invent Mr. Jefre? Were they not being taken seriously by the business and needed a male-sounding name to sell the story? So many woman authors through the centuries adopted what would be taken as men's names as pseudonyms for their work. Why did it take so long for them to change the attribution of a 1948 play, 19 years, that has no record of ever being produced?

What happened to the Brandts after "Alibi Me" was on *Suspense* radio and TV and on *Alfred Hitchcock Presents*? We don't know. It's likely that they kept up freelance writing for ad agencies and public relations firms, but there is a newspaper clipping that said they were working for law firms, too. They were still pursuing their writing dreams. As late as 1961, Variety reported that "Mae and Ruth Brandt, a sister scripting team active in radio and television, are to be represented off-Broadway this fall by a production of their courtroom drama, 'Pick My Peers'." A similar notice was posted in the *Back Stage* newspaper about the same time noting that the play was scheduled to open in November. No record of the production has been found in any of the theatrical data bases for previews or official opening. It was likely never produced. There are copyright registrations for new Brandt plays and songs as late as 1969. After that, there is nothing.

Mae and Ruth are buried in a family grave in a Long Island cemetery. Mae died in 1998; Ruth in 2002. No obituaries have been found as of this writing.

## Peggy Maley's Mommy Monster on a Radio *Dragnet* Denise Noe

I first became a fan of actress Peggy Maley when I saw her as Veda Pinella in the 1957 crime drama *The Midnight Story*. Starring Tony Curtis as a cop, it tells the story of the investigation into a priest's murder. Maley only appears in two scenes. The pretty platinum blonde plays a woman who is "stepping out" on her husband and gets beaten by him as a result. The boyfriend has a link to the murder suspect so she is questioned by police officers. She appears for questioning wearing sunglasses to cover a black eye her husband inflicted.

Peggy Maley intrigued me by playing Veda with an interesting combination of femininity, toughness, and a dash of masochism. Her performance inspired me to write a poem entitled "the adulteress wears dark glasses in the dark" that was published.

I started watching movies and TV episodes in which Peggy Maley appeared: *Human Desire, The Bigamist, Indestructible Man, The Guns of Fort Petticoat, The Lady Says No, Live Fast, Die* Young, and three *Perry Mason* episodes. I researched her life and learned she made her most well-remembered appearance as a beautician in the 1953 Marlon Brando vehicle *The Wild One* which I also watched. In *The Wild* One, she delivered the famous feeder line to Johnny, Brando's motorcycle gang leader. She is dancing with a member of the leather jacketed BRMC and asks what the letters represent. She is told "Black Rebels Motorcycle Club." She asks Johnny, "What are you rebelling against?"

"What do you got?" he replies.

Beautiful and talented, Peggy Maley enjoyed a busy Hollywood career from 1943 to 1959 but without ever attaining stardom. She enjoyed romances with Al Capone's cousin Joe Fischetti, Columbia boss Harry Cohn, and deposed Egyptian King Farouk who apparently kept her for a period. As she aged, her career faded. She left Hollywood in the early 1960s to manage her father's bars and restaurants in New Jersey. At the time of her death at 84, she resided in Hatfield, Pennsylvania.

Maley was in at least two radio episodes, both in *Dragnet*. Her most memorable radio performance — perhaps her most memorable performance period — was in an episode entitled "The Big Love" that first aired on July 5, 1951. It started with an announcement by George Fenneman, "Ladies and gentlemen, this program is for you, not your children." After that was the usual opening announcement, "Ladies and gentlemen, the story you are about to hear is true. Only the names have been changed to protect the innocent." "The Big Love" opened with a special warning because children would be likely to be disturbed by a story about a crime against a child.

We are soon told that a woman and her two-yearold child have gone missing for no apparent reason and have been gone five days. Detectives must find them. We learn that the case of the missing mom and toddler is "the Gorman case." Mrs. Barbara Gorman was apparently "keeping company" with a fellow other than her husband. Detectives go to interview the informant, John Pierson, who is a neighbor of the Gormans and lives next door to Barbara's boyfriend, Ralph Kane. The most familiar voice is that of the famous Jack Webb playing Detective Joe Friday. The cops learn that Ralph has not been to work or seen around the neighborhood for about the same amount of time the mother and child vanished.

Fridav and another detective find the neighbor/informant on his back porch feeding a pair of house cats. Meows are heard and Pierson playfully calls the cats "greedy little devils," lending a sense of everyday reality to the story. Pierson informs Friday and another cop that Mrs. Barbara Gorman and Ralph Kane had been seeing each other for "about six months" and that she and her husband had been rowing about it. Asked about the Gorman child, little Nancy, Pierson replied, "Tragic. Such a sweet little thing." He continued that, despite her tender age, Mrs. Gorman "was after her with a stick all the time." Appalled by such harsh treatment, he commented that Barbara Gorman "was not much of a mother." He commented that he could not understand why little Nancy was also missing. After all, Mrs. Gorman was not normally affectionate with her. He speculated, "If you're going to run off with a man, you don't take your family along." Given that the mother is so harsh with the youngster, there is an ominous foreshadowing here.

Cops check on Ralph Kane and learn he had one arrest for petty theft. They interview the husband of the missing woman and father, Philip Gorman, who is groundskeeper at a baseball park. Background noises are heard like a bat hitting a baseball and a crowd making indecipherable chit chat. Philip Gorman is interested to know if the cops have any new information about his missing wife and child. They go inside a "shack" to get "away from the noise." Cops confront the man with his not being forthcoming when asked about a reason his wife might have taken off. They mention Ralph Kane.

"Yeah, yeah, I knew about it," he acknowledges. He had not mentioned "the other man" for fear of scandal. "I didn't want people to find out what a bum I married," he sadly states. He had met his wife when he was overseas in the Army. (This was, after all, first broadcast a few years after the end of WWII.) "After the baby was born, she started to change, nothing satisfied her, she began running around," he disclosed. "She was nothing but a bum and I guess I found out too late." Asked specifically about Ralph Kane, Philip describes him as a bachelor who works in a print shop. "Pretty good-looking guy, got money to spend, that's all Barbara cares about." He later says, "The one thing I'm really worried about is my little girl, Nancy." He no longer cares about his wife but just wants the child back. He cannot understand why Barbara took Nancy along.

"The only thing I can figure out is the wife hated me more than I thought," Philip speculates. "She knew I thought Nancy is the greatest thing alive. So rather than let me have her, she took her along." His only concern is with the child, adding, "As far as I'm concerned, my wife never lived." He later says, "You think you got the greatest set-up in the world: nice home, job, baby, good furniture, everything you need — everything but a wife."

The search continues. The manager of an auto court lodging calls the police. A man, a woman, and a little girl had stopped at his place the previous evening. Shown pictures of the missing trio, he identified them as the people he had seen. They had stayed at his place and left. They had also left something behind: part of little girl's dress. It was stained. Tests showed the stains were human blood. After ten more days, Ralph Kane and Barbara Gorman are located at another auto court and put under surveillance.

But there is no sign of little Nancy.

Cops swoop down on the love nest. We never hear from Ralph Kane but are told he was taken out to a police car for interrogation. Barbara Gorman was interrogated in the cottage. Friday describes her as "a tall blonde, thin-faced and nervous" who "spoke with a decided accent." Peggy Maley plays Barbara Gorman. Told she can sit down to relax, she shows annoyance as she says, "How can anyone relax? These questions — you have no right to do this." She is reminded that police are searching for a missing child — her child. Barbara insists she does not know where the child is. She claims the twoyear-old "ran away." Barbara says, "I don't know what happened to the kid. She's gone, that's all." What about the little dress that was found with blood on it? She claims it was used to bandage a scratch on Ralph.

Asked about her baby girl, she answers, "I didn't want her in the first place, my husband did. It was a mistake." So why take the child with her when she left Philip Gorman? Given her lack of affection for the toddler, Friday observes that she must have taken the child with her just for "spite." She insists, "Nancy ran away, that's all" — as if a child that young could be a runaway.

It is Friday who recalls for the audience an updated story told by Barbara Gorman. She and Ralph brooded over their situation. Ralph was certain to lose his job and had few prospects of finding another. Taking Nancy along was obviously a mistake. Ralph wanted to abandon her but Barbara refused to do so and Friday again calls the motivation "pure spite."

"The Big Love" may well be the darkest and sickest *Dragnet* episode ever. Yet its title is appropriate. Barbara Gorman is a woman sickened by romantic love — so sickened that it not only undercuts her protective instincts toward her child but takes away even the slightest bit of decency.

"We love each other, we are in love, Ralph and I," she says in a dreamy lovesick manner that serves to accent the horror of what their "Big Love" wrought. "The way I love Ralph — it was everything, it was the whole world. . . . You can't hurt us, Ralph and I. You can't take away what we've got, you'll never take that away. . . . I'll keep on loving him." She observes, "We'll pay for our mistakes." "Yeah, they're going to cost you," Friday tartly retorts. The episode does not end with the interrogation of mommy monster but with the grief of the father, the normally loving father.

"The Big Love" is a mystery, a thriller, and a horror story. The horror is all the greater for having no supernatural element but simply depending on the depths to which human beings can sink. The episode benefits from a tight and fearless script as well as the usual dry performance of Jack Webb as Joe Friday. However, this perverse episode ultimately belongs to Peggy Maley who truly shows off her acting chops. She plays Barbara Gorman, a neglectful mother, soon to be revealed as a monstrous mother, in a manner makes her ghastly yet believable. She sounds annoyed, frightened, callous, and utterly devoted to her even more monstrous boyfriend as is called for by this darkest and nastiest of Dragnet stories. It is an extraordinary and wonderfully skilled vocal performance.

### In Memoriam

Unfortunately, the weeks since our last issue have witnessed a spate of old-time radio-related passings. Below are brief overviews of three long broadcasting and entertainment careers.

### Helen Fuller Dies at 102

Barbara Deane Fuller, b. July 31, 1921, is most remembered by old-time radio fans as Claudia from One's Man Family. She was a veteran of more than 25 radio serials including *The Guiding Light, Ma Perkins, Road of Life, Scattergood Baines, Today's Children,* and *Whispering Streets*.

A review of her existing recordings on the Radio Gold Index shows she was a prolific radio actress, appearing in various drama, comedy, and detective series over the years, from *Nightbeat* to *The Cavalcade of America*, to *The Life of Riley*.

Fuller additionally earned many roles in motion pictures and television as well from the 1940s into the 1970s. She died on May 15, 2024

### John Rayburn Dies at 96

John Rayburn, b. 1927, spent nearly 60 years in broadcasting, much of it in the Denver area. While the bread and butter of his career was sports and news programs, Rayburn was nevertheless a familiar name in hobby circles because he attended numerous old-time radio conventions (this writer met him at the Cincinnati Nostalgia Convention) and published a memoir with McFarland in 2008 and a separate OTR volume with Bear Manor in 2018.

Rayburn started as a DJ in Cape Girardeau, MO, in 1946, right after his time in the U.S. Navy. He was quickly assigned to do play-by-play of local football and basketball games as well.

After moving between a number of stations Rayburn ended up in Denver where he spent several decades on the air for all the city's major television stations. He was inducted into the Broadcast Pioneers of Colorado Hall of Fame in 2009. Rayburn died on May 19, 2024.

### Janis Paige Dies at 101

Janis Paige, b. September 16, 1922, got into show business as a young girl and made a career of it for over six decades. Her work included film, theatre, television, and dramatic radio.

Paige's radio credits include The *Chesterfield Music Shop*, *Stars on Parade*, and *Theatre of Romance*. Her motion picture work earned her a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in 1960. She died on June 2, 2024.

# New Suspense Recording Joe Webb

The May 25<sup>th</sup> (2024) *Suspense* episode is "Strange, for a Killer" with Van Johnson. Today's recordings is a real treat for classic radio and *Suspense* fans. A broadcast recording of this episode has never been available, *until now*.

The only prior surviving recording was the broadcast's raw pre-recorded drama segments without music and other elements. Those would be performed live at the time of broadcast. This recording is a home tape recorded off-the-air from WJR-Detroit on that March 1951 night.

The blogpost has important background about these recordings. Listening to BOTH the drama-only recording AND the aircheck recording is revealing. The contrast increases appreciation of the key contribution that the custom-composed music made to the quality of *Suspense* broadcasts and how it enhanced the acting performances.



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






### This business of marketing and preserving old-time radio was started 50 years ago by a teenage version of myself.

We began by advertising in Stereo Review, Audio, High Fidelity and Popular Science Magazines (all mostly defunct now). Then we hit the nostalgia circuit: The Nostalgia Journal, The Comics Buyers Guide and others. Soon I was also in touch with various old time radio collector's groups through publications such as Nostalgia Radio News, Hello Again, National Radio Trader, The Old Time Radio Collectors of Buffalo's "Illustrated Press," and others. I contributed to many of those before **Joe Webb** and I started Collector's Corner. It was sort of a spin-off of what I was doing and **Jerry Chapman's** Airwaves newsletter. We were all inspired by **Jay Hickerson's** Hello, Again.

Through another Michigan OTR fan (Bruce Rittenhouse), I even found an exclusive blank tape supplier nearby, Gary Kramer, then known as "Omega Magnetics" at the time in nearby Redford, Michigan.

A lot happened after that...I mean A LOT. The highlights (and lowlights) are numerous.

Suffice it to say, we never stopped. We only went through many phases. Various friendships were formed. A few battle lines were evendrawn.

One of those friends was **Reg Hubert** of Sudbury, Ontario, Canada. He headed a non-profit old-time radio club based in Canada. Woody Allen's **"Radio Days"** feature film was released. Knight-Ridder and Detroit Free Press columnist **James Ricci** was looking for a local (Detroit) tie in to the Woody Allen movie. As I understand it, Reg sent Ricci to me.

In March of 1987, a nationally syndicated article was published about old-time radio and what I was doing to preserve and market it. **Nothing in my life was ever the same after that!** Articles, publications, conventions, buying groups, a satellite radio show, even legal adventures would follow. That along with a re-energized professional career in broadcast engineering became my life.

It could NOT have happened without the support of a lot people who recognized we had something good to offer, and me NOT willing to give up, when things got lean.

In these publications and catalogs, I always list by name, just a few of the key OTR people who helped along the way (and some continue to do so), but the list is much longer than that. **Your** name would probably be on it as well, so thanks for YOUR support!

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# **Big Bands on Radio**

Known as the "sentimental gentleman of swing," **Tommy Dorsey** was a regular on radio during the 1940s, playing live remote broadcasts as well as hosting his own show. In 1936, he was on the air with comedian Jack Pearl on a show sponsored by a cigaret company. A year later, he took over the show as host. At one point in 1946, Dorsey was on four shows on both Mutual and the NBC Network.

In 1943, he hired the famed drummer **Gene Krupa** after Krupa's arrest for marijuana possession. **Frank Sinatra** also sang with Dorsey's band. Dorsey was inducted into the Radio Hall of Fame in 1989. He died in November of 1956 at age 51 reportedly from accidental choking.
